GOD BLESSES AND HEALS US

Most of us sincerely desire to grow in wisdom and in faith. Today's readings explore the challenges we face when we allow God to lead the way. We first hear the author of the book of Wisdom extolling the value of wisdom in our lives. Then in Hebrews we are told that sometimes God exposes difficult truths about ourselves. These readings set up Mark's story of the wealthy man. In his encounter with Jesus, the man faced a very harsh truth, that his possessions actually possessed him and blocked his path to God. We may have similar "moments of truth" when we have an overwhelming desire to minimize or to run away from truth that God reveals to us. In these moments, may we remember that God always seeks to bless and heal us. In these moments, may God open our hearts to receive truth with faith and courage.

Wasn't the Devil an Angel?

Scripture and the Catechism of the Catholic Church speak of the fall of the angels in which they freely, radically, and irrevocably rejected God and His reign. Among those fallen angels was **Lucifer**, whose name means "bearer of light" and who held a high position as a good angel. Now referred to as Satan, the devil is depicted in the Book of Revelation as a huge red dragon with 7 heads, 10 horns, 7 crowns and a large tail. When he rejected God, he began a war in heaven. Michael and his angels fought against the rebellious Satan and his angel followers and defeated them, casting them down from heaven.

What are the Different Types of Angels?

The Church Fathers agreed that there are different classifications of angels with distinct activities and missions. Prominent saints throughout history - including St. Ambrose, St. Jerome, St. Gregory the Great, and St. Hildegard - have proposed schemes of angelic organization. Perhaps most famously, St. Thomas Aquinas in his *Summa Theologica* developed a scripture-based structure of three spheres of angels, each containing three orders or choirs.

The **Seraphim** are the highest choir in the angelic hierarchy. In the Book of Isaiah, they are described as constantly praising God and are the caretakers of God's throne. They are said to have six wings: two each to cover their faces, to cover their feet, and for flying.

Next are the **Cherubim**, often depicted in Western art as small, plump, winged boys. They are described in the Book of Ezekiel as guarding the throne of God and having four faces - one of a man, an ox, a lion, and an eagle - symbols later ascribed to the four evangelists. The Book of Genesis also says that Cherubim guard the way to the Tree of Life in the Garden of Eden.

The third choir are the **Thrones**, who serve as elders and symbols of justice. Thrones are considered to be warrior angels who defend against evil spirits.

The angels in these first three choirs all see and adore God in His presence, but the angels in the lower hierarchy need the Thrones in order to access God.

Another tier of heavenly beings are closely involved with human affairs. **Principalities**, the highest ranked in this grouping, care for earthly dwellings, such as cities and countries.

Next are the **Archangels**, who are God's messengers. They are considered the leading angels (as Michael who led the battle against Satan).

Finally, the last group are simply **Angels** who lead and guide people. These include Guardian Angels, the protectors of individual people.

WEEK BY WEEK A BABY GROWS - FROM CONCEPTION TO LABOR

At 2 weeks - Fertilization At the start of this week, you ovulate. Your egg is fertilized 12 to 24 hours later if a sperm penetrates it – and this simple biological occurrence begins a series of increasingly complicated processes that leads to a new human life, if all goes well. Over the next several days, the fertilized egg will start dividing into multiple cells as it travels down the fallopian tube, enters your uterus, and starts to burrow into the uterine lining.

3 weeks - Implantation Now nestled in the nutrient-rich lining of your uterus is a microscopic ball of hundreds of rapidly multiplying cells that will develop into your baby. This ball, called a blastocyst, has begun to produce the pregnancy hormone hCG, which tells your ovaries to stop releasing eggs.

4 weeks - Your ball of cells is now officially an embryo. You're now about 4 weeks from the beginning of your last period. It's around this time – when your next period would normally be due – that you might be able to get a positive result on a home pregnancy test. Your baby is the size of a poppy seed.

5 weeks - Your baby resembles a tadpole more than a human, but it is growing fast. The circulatory system is beginning to form, and the tiny “heart” will start to beat this week. Your baby is the size of a sesame seed.

6 weeks - Your baby’s nose, mouth and ears are starting to take shape, and the intestines and brain are beginning to develop. Your baby is the size of a lentil.

7 weeks - Your baby has doubled in size since last week, but still has a tail which will soon disappear. Little hands and feet that look more like paddles are emerging from the emerging arms and legs. Your baby is the size of a blueberry.

8 weeks - Your baby has started moving around, though you won’t feel the movement yet. Nerve cells are branching out, forming primitive neural pathways. Breathing tubes now extend from the baby’s throat to his/her developing lungs. Your baby is the size of a kidney bean.

9 weeks - Your baby’s physiology is in place (he/she even has tiny earlobes), but there’s much more to come. The embryonic tail has disappeared. The baby weighs just a fraction of an ounce, but is about to start gaining weight fast. Your baby is the size of a grape.

10 weeks - The embryo has completed the most critical portion of development. His/her skin is still translucent, but the tiny limbs can bend and fine details like nails are starting to form. Your baby is the size of a kumquat.

11 weeks - Your baby is almost fully formed. He/she is kicking, stretching, and even hiccupping as the diaphragm develops, although you can’t feel any activity yet. Your baby is the size of a fig.

12 weeks - This week your baby’s reflexes kick in: His/her fingers will soon begin to open and close, toes will curl, and the mouth will make sucking movements. The baby will feel it if you gently poke your tummy though you won’t feel any movements yet. Your baby is the size of a lime.

13 weeks - Your baby’s fingers now have fingerprints, and organs are clearly visible through the skin. If you’re having a girl, her ovaries contain more than 2 million eggs. Your baby is the size of a pea pod.

This is the last week of the first trimester of pregnancy.
